


Incorporated: 1764

Origin: This territory was a part of the Dover and Squamscot Patent known Bloody Point, in memory of a victory by early colonists over an attacking band of Indians in the late 1600s. Following a boundary dispute with Greenland in 1714, Governor Joseph Dudley gave it the name Newington Parish. In 1952, the US Air Force took command of Portsmouth Airport for a bomber base, and land for expansion was taken from Portsmouth, Newington, and Greenland; about 60 percent of the airport is in Newington. In 1957, the facility was named for Captain Harl Pease, a WWII fighter pilot posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. The base fell to BRAC closure in 1991, but still houses the NH Air National Guard.



Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 542 residents in 1790

Population Trends: Population change for Newington decreased over 54 years, a numeric change of 245, from 1,045 in 1960 down to 800 in 2014. The only positive



percent change in population was between 1980 and 1990 when it grew by 38 percent; four decades had population declines. The 2014 Census estimate for Newington was 800 residents, which tied with Albany, ranking 198th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.



Population Density and Land Area, 2014 (US Census Bureau): 97.1 persons per square mile of land area. Newington contains 8.2 square miles of land area and 4.1 square miles of inland water area.
