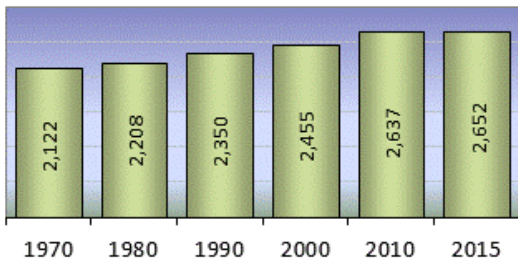
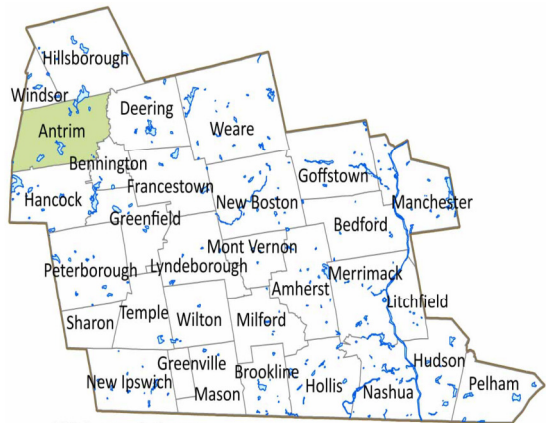

**Incorporated: 1777**

**Origin:** Though settled prior to the Revolution, this community was not incorporated as Antrim until 1777. It was originally part of the Society Land, or Cumberland, named for the Duke of Cumberland, who was King George II's son and commander of English troops in the war with France. This large tract of land adjacent to Mount Monadnock had been set aside by the Portsmouth Proprietors for private estates. The land was later purchased by Philip Riley, who named the town for County Antrim in Ireland, his native home. Nathaniel Hawthorne College was established in Antrim in 1962; the school closed in 1988.

**Villages and Place Names:** Antrim Center, Clinton Village, Loverens Mill, North Branch

**Population, Year of the First Census Taken:** 528 residents in 1790



**Population Trends:** Population change for Antrim totaled 1,531 over 55 years, from 1,121 in 1960 to 2,652 in 2015. The largest decennial percent change was an 89 percent increase between 1960 and 1970; the other four decades in this period had population increases under ten percent. The 2015 Census estimate for Antrim was 2,652 residents, which ranked 116th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

**Population Density and Land Area, 2015 (US Census Bureau):** 74.3 persons per square mile of land area. Antrim contains 35.7 square miles of land area and 0.8 square miles of inland water area.
