


**Incorporated:** 1776

**Origin:** This territory was first granted in 1752 by the Masonian Proprietors as Monadnock Number 5. On some early maps, the town was called Oxford, and was referenced as New Marlborough in early state documents. Many of the settlers were from Marlborough, Massachusetts, which had been named for John Churchill, Duke of Marlborough, in the late 1600s. The town was incorporated as Marlborough in 1776. At one time there was a thriving granite quarrying industry in Marlborough.

**Population, Year of the First Census Taken:** 786 residents in 1790

**Population Trends:** Population change for Marlborough totaled 228 over 54 years, from 1,612 in 1960 to 1,840 in 2014. The largest decennial percent change was a 10 percent increase between 1970 and 1980; the four other decades had increases of five percent or less. The 2014 Census estimate for Marlborough was 1,840 residents, which ranked 144th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.
