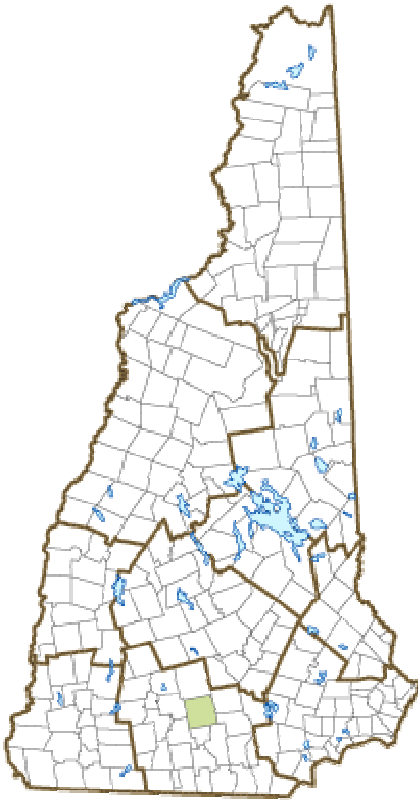

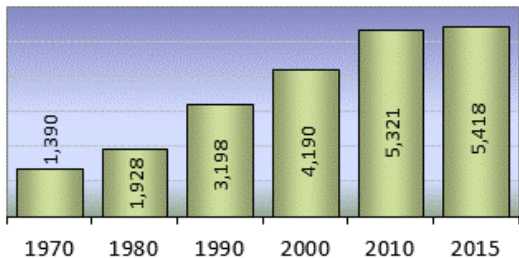
Incorporated: 1763

Origin: This territory was first granted in 1736 by Governor Jonathan Belcher of Massachusetts to John Simpson and others who were soldiers, or their heirs, engaged in the 1690 Canada Expedition. For a time, the town was known as Lanestown or Piscataquog Township. In 1748, the Masonian Proprietors confirmed the grant. Not all the grantees took claim, and in 1751 the territory was granted to Job Lewis and others. In 1763, Governor Benning Wentworth formally adopted the long-used name of New Boston.

Villages and Place Names: Klondike Corner

Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 1,202 residents in 1790

Population Trends: Population change for New Boston totaled 4,493 over 55 years, from 925 in 1960 to 5,418 in 2015. The largest decennial percent change was a



66 percent increase

between 1980 and 1990;

the second largest was a 50 percent increase between 1960 and 1970. The 2015 Census estimate for New Boston was 5,418 residents, which ranked 61st among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

Population Density and Land Area, 2015 (US Census Bureau): 126.1 persons per square mile of land area. New Boston contains 43.0 square miles of land area and 0.2 square miles of inland water area.
