
Northfield, NH



Incorporated: 1780

Origin: Like many other towns, Northfield began with a group of residents who felt they lived too far from the center of town, in this case Canterbury, making it inconvenient to attend public affairs. Petitioners were granted a separate township in 1780. The Northfield library was called the "Northfield Improving Society for the Promotion of Useful Knowledge," the same title used by Benjamin Franklin in 1743 for the American Philosophical Society in Philadelphia. The library began with a supply of 24 books, charging an annual membership fee of \$5, and continued under that name until 1842.


2,717 over 50 years, from 2,193 in 1970 to 4,910 in 2020. The largest decennial percent change was a 40 percent increase from 1980 and 1990, following a 39 percent increase from 1970 to 1980. The town's population increased by two percent from 2010 to 2020. The 2022 Census estimate for Northfield was 4,978 residents, which ranked 74th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

Population Density and Land Area, 2022 (US Census Bureau): 174.1 persons per square mile of land area. Northfield contains 28.6 square miles of land area and 0.3 square miles of inland water area.
