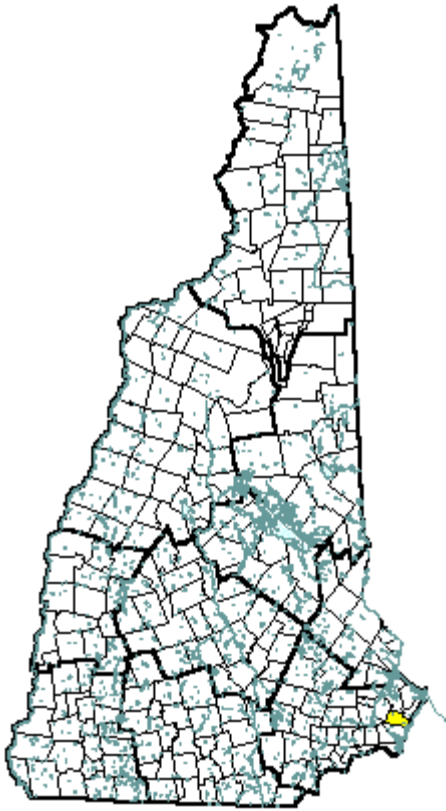

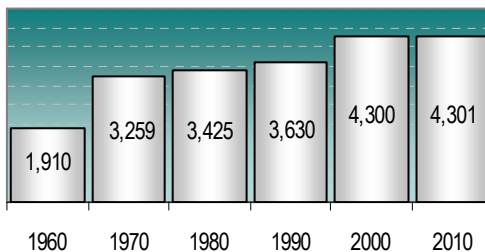

**Incorporated:** 1742

**Origin:** First settled in 1639, this town was a part of Hampton known as North Hill Parish. Residents began petitioning for a separate parish as early as 1719. North Hill Parish was set off from Hampton in 1738, with the responsibility of supporting a clergyman and schoolmaster of their own. Full township privileges were not granted until 1742, following the establishment of the New Hampshire-Massachusetts border. North Hampton was the birthplace of General Henry Dearborn, commander-in-chief of the American forces in the War of 1812, for whom Fort Dearborn (now Chicago) and Dearborn, Michigan, were named.

## Population Trends:

Population change for North Hampton totaled 2,391 over 50 years, from 1,910 in 1960 to 4,301 in 2010. The largest decennial percent change was 71 percent between 1960 and 1970. The 2010 Census estimate for North Hampton was 4,301 residents, which ranked 87th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

**Population Density and Land Area, 2010** (*US Census Bureau*): 309.1 persons per square mile of land area. North Hampton contains 13.9 square miles of land area and 0.5 square miles of inland water area.
