### New Hampshire Employment Projections by Industry and Occupation

#### **Projections Highlights**

#### Introduction


Employment in New Hampshire is projected to grow by 5.8 percent from 2022 to 2032, an increase of 42,000 jobs over the period. Total employment is expected to increase from 719,300 in 2022 to 761,300 in 2032. On an annual basis, there will be an expected 84,400 openings from growth and the need to replace workers.

This report includes projections for 20 industry sectors, more than 100 detailed industries, and more than 700 occupations. Projected growth in industries depends on changes in population, income, and demand for the products and services New Hampshire workers produce. Occupational growth is measured in three ways: actual number of jobs, percent change over the ten-year period, and the number of projected openings from exits, transfers, and growth. Each occupation is also identified with the education, training, and experience required for an entry-level position.

By 2022, the base year for this employment projection, the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic had diminished. Therefore, the employment outlook over the next decade is more in line with the long-term employment trend experienced in New Hampshire prior to the pandemic.


#### **Industry Projections**

- Healthcare and social assistance sector alone accounts for more than 9,100 projected new jobs, an increase of nearly ten percent, from 2022 to 2032. This sector is involved with providing for the care of an increasing aging population.
- Employment in the professional, technical, and scientific services is projected to increase by more than 6,900 jobs, an
  increase of nearly 15 percent, in a broad sector that includes computer systems design and related services; management,
  scientific, and technical consulting services; and architectural, engineering and related services, providing expertise to help
  organizations to become more efficient and profitable.
- Accommodation and food service employment in 2022 is less than in 2019 when 60,400 were employed in the sector. Jobs lost during the pandemic and the brief recession of spring 2020 that followed have nearly all been recovered, with employment in 2022 at 58,000. As customers return to restaurants and tourist attractions, another 4,900 jobs are projected to be added by 2032.
- Gains are also expected in construction and manufacturing, with each sector adding more than 2,100 jobs, boosted by a generally strong economy and increases in infrastructure spending and housing construction
- Employment in retail trade is projected to decrease by nearly 1,600 jobs as brick-and-mortar stores face competition from online sales. Wholesale trade will offset these losses, increasing by nearly 2,500 jobs over ten years. This indicate that even with a shift toward e-commerce, workers are still needed in the promotion, sales, transportation, and delivery of goods.




#### **Occupational Projections**

- Of the major occupational groups, computer and mathematical occupations is projected to be the fastest growing, at 18.1 percent over the ten-year period. The largest numeric change is projected for management occupations, with 5,100 new jobs by 2032.
- Healthcare practitioners and healthcare support occupations, two separate major occupational groups, account for 7,725 of all new projected jobs by 2032, 18.5 percent of all new jobs in the ten-year period. Increased demand in these occupations is driven by an aging population which typically has increased need for caregiving and therapy. Employment will also expand with new treatments and innovations in medical technology. Home health and personal care aides, registered nurses, and nurse practitioners are three occupations projected to experience large increases in employment.
- Computer and mathematical occupations include software developers, an occupation that is projected to add nearly 2,400 jobs over the 2022 to 2032 decade due to the expansion of artificial intelligence (AI), cybersecurity, cloud computing, robotics, and other applications.
- Food preparation and serving related occupations are projected to see about 11,200 openings each year, more than any other group. Occupations with the most annual openings are led by fast food and counter workers (3,312 openings), cashiers (3,211), retail salespersons (2,822), and stockers and order fillers (2,588). Most of the openings will come from the need to replace workers due to the movement of persons from job to job.
- Employment in business and financial occupations is projected to increase by more than 4,200 over the projections period in occupations including accountants and auditors, and human resources specialists.
- At the detailed level, occupations adding the most new jobs from 2022 to 2032 represent many different major occupational
  groups, from technical occupations to health care, management, as well as transportation. These detailed occupations
  also vary in the educational requirement needed of entry-level workers. Some require a bachelor's degree where other
  occupations require no formal education.

#### **Occupational Outlook Indicators**

Projected growth and employment numbers appear to be precise but should only be used as a general guide to occupational employment trends in a ten-year period. A simpler, user-friendly method is to refer to the symbols that accompany each occupation in the occupational tables.

- ★ Very Favorable. Occupations that combine a growth rate of at least 5.6 percent and at least 23 annual job openings are described as *very favorable*. These occupations are expected to provide the best employment opportunities through 2032.
- Favorable. Occupations that have a low rate of growth combined with a relatively high number of job openings area considered *favorable*. An occupation may also be *favorable* if the growth rate is better than average, but the number of job openings is below average; or the growth rate is average, and the number of job openings is average or better.
- Less Favorable. Occupations considered *less favorable* have better expected opportunities than the least favorable category, either because of a higher growth rate or a larger number of projected job openings.
- ✔ Not Favorable. Occupations identified as *not favorable* have a negative rate of growth and few annual openings per year. These occupations are not expected to be significant sources of jobs through 2032.

#### Entry-Level Education, Work Experience, and Post-Hire Training

For each occupation, the typical education, related work experience, and post-hire training expected of entry-level workers have been identified. The first two categories show the educational attainment and work experience in a related occupation expected before an individual is employed. The last category refers to on-the-job training, apprenticeship, internship, or residency typically conducted after the individual has started working.

#### **Educational Attainment**

These categories indicate the typical level of education most workers need for an entry-level position in the occupation:

- Doctoral (PhD) or professional degree (i.e., MD, DD, JD, DC)
- Master's degree (i.e., MA, MS, MEd)
- Bachelor's degree (i.e., BS, BA, BFA)
- Associate's degree (i.e., AS, AA)
- Postsecondary non-degree award (program completion, i.e., CNA, cosmetologist)
- Some college, no degree
- High school diploma or equivalent (GED)
- No formal educational credential.

#### **Work Experience**

Some occupations require work experience in a related occupation as an entry-level qualification. Frequently, these occupations are managerial or supervisory positions, where the worker performs the same job tasks as the workers under their supervision, such as retail supervisors, marketing managers, or construction managers. Non-supervisory workers may also have an experience requirement, such as restaurant cooks or industrial truck and tractor operators. Work experience categories range from *none*, *less than five years*, or *five years or more*.

#### **Post-Hire Training**

This category identifies additional training or preparation typically needed to gain competency in the occupation once the worker is employed. This type of training is occupation-specific, not job-specific, meaning skills can be transferred to another job in the same occupation. The job training categories are:

- Internship or residency
- Apprenticeship
- Long-term on-the-job training (over 12 months)
- Moderate-term on-the-job training (one to 12 months)
- · Short-term on-the-job training (one month or less of informal training)
- None

#### **Projections Methodology: Annual Job Openings**

Projections Methodology: Annual Job Openings U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics has developed a methodology for estimating annual job openings that tries to incorporate workforce dynamics of the twenty-first century. This methodology recognizes that an individual may have several career changes throughout the course of their working life.

National separation rates, calculated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, are used to estimate separations on a statewide basis, which are the number of workers in New Hampshire projected to leave an occupation to retire, leave the labor force for reasons other than retirement, or to transfer to a different occupation. Separation rates are used to estimate the number of workers who permanently leave an occupation and need to be replaced by a new entrant into that occupation. This is not a measure of turnover, referred to as movement within an occupation. An example of turnover is a cashier leaving one retail establishment to take a job at another establishment.

Labor force exits are defined as workers that leave the workforce entirely to go to school, start a family, or retire, for example. Occupational transfers are defined as workers that leave one occupation to become employed in some other occupation in a different occupational group, due to promotion or simply a job change. Total projected annual job openings are the combination of labor force exits, occupational transfers, and openings created from growth. As a worker departs a position, whether to exit the labor force or to change occupations, a job opening is created.

Job openings are also created from new growth, which is simply the difference between base year employment and projected employment. Growth occurs when there is demand for workers in an occupation, due to increased demand for products and services produced those workers. Growth for an occupation can be negative, such as when fewer workers are needed to achieve the same level of productivity.

The number of job openings projected for a specific occupation is correlated with the number of individuals currently employed in the occupation. Occupations with higher estimated employment usually have many annual job openings, while occupations with fewer workers are expected to have fewer annual job openings.

Some of the advantages of the new methodology are that it makes a distinction between the volume of workers who will be exiting the workforce as the baby boomer generation ages into retirement and workers who change careers and move from one occupation to another. Projected job openings for an occupation should not be viewed as a precise estimate of the number of expected openings but more as a general guide to the magnitude of job openings in comparison to other occupations. In addition, long–term projections for prior periods should not be used as a comparison to determine how occupational demand has changed over time.
