First quarter employment showed over-theyear decline for first time in ten years

Manufacturing took the largest hit

ew Hampshire's covered employment was reduced by more than 13,800 jobs from 1st quarter 2001 to 1st quarter 2002. Manufacturing fell 16,109 jobs during this time frame, driving the over-the-year total job decline. The last time employment in the 1st quarter dropped was ten years ago when nearly 2,300 jobs were lost in 1992 when compared to the same quarter in 1991.

Six of every ten Manufacturing jobs lost were in two major groups - Industrial machinery and equipment and Electronic and other electrical equipment. Overall, fifteen of the nineteen major groups within Manufacturing decreased employment from 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2001 to 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2002.

On the bright side, some industry divisions gained employment. Construction gained 1,908 jobs over-the-year. The mild winter weather could be attributed to employment increases in all three major groups in this division. Government showed the largest over-the-year gain, 2,891 jobs. The

majority of these were in Local government, specifically Local government education.

Retail trade added 1,130 jobs from 1st quarter 2001 to 1st quarter 2002. Almost all of the new jobs were in Eating and drinking places, Building materials and garden supplies stores, and Automotive dealers and service stations.

#### **Average Weekly Wage**

The average weekly wage for all industries increased slightly, \$1.62, from 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2001 to 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2002. When comparing divisions, however, some large changes occurred. Construction's average weekly wage saw the largest increase, \$75.54. As with employment, all major groups in this division saw increases over-the-year. Retail trade and Finance, insurance, and real estate saw increases of \$14.41 and \$10.43 respectively.

Wholesale trade recorded the largest decrease among the divisions, \$34.70. Most of this decrease was in Durable goods.
