Once again, New Hampshire has no designated Labor Surplus Areas. It is one of only four states with no areas listed. The other three states are Delaware, Hawaii, and Wyoming.

The last time a Labor Surplus Area was designated in New Hampshire was in May 2004. Though the Labor Surplus Areas are normally published in October, the process was delayed until May that year.
