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New Hampshire's Labor Market Areas Changed

Census 2000 Commuting and Population Data Drove Changes

New Hampshire's labor market areas have changed. A labor market area is a general term used to describe an economically integrated region within which workers can readily change jobs without changing their place of residence.

How will the changes affect you? If you are an employer, the changes shouldn't affect you very much. If you are a data user, these changes will mean that you will need to familiarize yourself with the new areas. It also means you won't be able to compare the data for the new areas with the historical data previously published by the old areas. Who is responsible for the change?

Since the 1950 Decennial Census, the Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has reviewed the commuting patterns and economic dependence between counties every ten years. In New England this review is done at the city and town level. Using the Census data, the OMB revised or created new statistical areas across the country.

Effective June 2003, the OMB designated Core Based Statistical Areas (CBSA) as the new standard. These replaced the old standard of Metropoli-

tan the Statistical Areas (MSA). According to the OMB, a CBSA is a statistical geographic entity consisting of a county associated with at least one core (urbanized area or urban cluster) of at least 10,000 population. The CBSA must have adjacent counties that have a high degree of social and economic integration with the core as measured through commuting ties. In New England the CBSA is called NECTA (New England City and Town Areas) and is defined using cities and towns or groups of cities and towns rather than counties.

NECTAs encompass roughly half of New Hampshire's cities, towns, and unincorporated places, however, they account for about three-quarters of the state's total population. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, with input from the Economic and Labor Market Information Bureau of New Hampshire Employment Security, divided the remainder of the state into small Labor Market Areas (LMA).

Metropolitan Areas

Under the new OMB process, the concept of a Metropolitan area remains. What has changed is the terminology. Similar to the old Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) and Primary Metropolitan Statistical Areas (PMSAs), the new areas are now called MetroNECTAs and NECTA Divisions.

New Hampshire has three MetroNECTAs - one is entirely within the state's borders (Manchester) and two are New Hampshire portions of interstate MetroNECTAs (Rochester-Dover and Portsmouth). The Manchester MetroNECTA consists of nine of the Granite State's cities and towns and claimed about 14 percent of total 2000 population.

These MetroNECTAs are core based statistical areas associated with at least one urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000. For New England states, these areas must also have adjacent cities and towns or groups of cities and towns that have a high degree of social and economic integration with the "core" as measured through commuting ties.

A NECTA containing a single core with a population of at least 2.5 million may be subdivided to form smaller groupings of cities and towns referred to as NECTA Divisions. Because New Hampshire's entire population is less than 2.5 million, there are obviously no NECTA Divisions entirely within the state's borders. There are, however, four areas that are designated as New Hampshire portions of interstate NECTA Divisions.


The Nashua NH-MA NECTA Division includes 19 of New Hampshire's cities and towns. With just over one-fifth of the state's population, this is the largest Metropolitan area in the state. The New Hampshire portion of the Haverhill-North Andover-Amesbury MA-NH NECTA Division (which is called the Exeter Area) includes 17 of the Granite State's cities and towns and claimed just under seven percent of the state's 2000 population. The remaining two NECTA Divisions include only one of the state's towns each.

Micropolitan Areas

The OMB also introduced a new area, the Micropolitan area or MicroNECTA. These areas are not quite booming Metros, but they are more than just rural communities.

New Hampshire has seven Micropolitan NECTAs (MicroNECTAs). Six of these are entirely within the state's borders while one is the New Hampshire portion of an interstate MicroNECTA. A MicroNECTA is a core based statistical area with at least one urban cluster that has a population of at least 10,000, but

less than 50,000. It must also have adjacent cities and towns or groups of cities and towns that have a high degree of social and economic integration with the "core" as measured through commuting ties.

"Micropolitans are becoming economic hubs, drawing workers from miles around."1 For example, Franklin City, with a population of 8,400 in 2000, was once part of the old Concord LMA. It is now its own MicroNECTA with an urban area population over 10,000. The Franklin NH MicroNECTA, which

includes the city of

Franklin and the towns of Tilton and Northfield, had a total population of 16,400 in 2000. This is one area of the state that has seen tremendous growth in the last decade. This shouldn't be a surprise for anyone who has taken Exit 20 off Interstate 93.

Small Labor Market **Areas**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is responsible for defining and designating the small Labor Market Areas (LMA). These areas include the remaining cities and towns not already classified as part

of a NECTA. Unlike the NECTA, the LMA designations were based on just commuting patterns; population was not a direct factor.

Under the new area designations, New Hampshire now has thirteen LMAs. Nine of these are entirely within the state's borders while four are New Hampshire portions of interstate LMAs.

Partly due to an increase in population, areas outside the larger cities are becoming more developed and offer more employment opportunities. This affects commuting patterns and helps redefine small labor market areas. As a result, some of the cities and towns that once were part of a larger LMA now have become small LMAs. For example, Hillsborough, Henniker, Deering, Washington, and Windsor were once part of the old Concord LMA. According to commuting patterns from Census 2000, these towns now make up the new Hillsborough NH LMA.

Unassigned Areas

The OMB process left four towns unassigned to any labor market area because the commuting patterns of their residents were not strong enough to show economic ties with a specific neighboring area. These towns are Deerfield, Newmarket, Northfield, and Nottingham.

Summary

In summary, the number of labor market areas (metropolitan areas, micropolitan areas, and small labor market areas) in New Hampshire increased from 18 to 27 as a result of this latest review of New Hampshire's commuting patterns and population. This total includes the areas that are completely within the state's borders as well as the New Hampshire portion of interstate areas.

> In general, January 2005 data will be the first to be published using the new labor market area designations. However, not all data will be published for all of the labor market areas. For instance, nonfarm employment and earnings estimates will only be pub

lished for four of the Metropolitan areas - the Manchester NH MetroNECTA and the New Hampshire portions of the Rochester-Dover NH-ME MetroNECTA, the Portsmouth NH-ME MetroNECTA, and the Nashua NH-MA NECTA Division.
