

The Lancaster LMA is another new labor market derived from the 1980's version of the Berlin LMA. See Table 10.1 for the commuting pattern summary of the five towns with population and employment, that along with two unincorporated places (with no reported population and commuting activity), make up the Lancaster LMA. The census counted an estimated 3,536 LMA residents worked during the sample taking period. The workforce, residents and nonresidents, numbered 3,483, showing a small net outflow of workers. The inhabitants of the LMA who remained in their respective towns to work added up to 1,889. The balance of the residents (1,647), commuted out to work in other towns or out-of-state. Statistical leaders in the LMA were the towns of Lancaster and Northumberland, whose numbers led in all categories across the Table. Both of these towns, as expected, had low commute-out rates and fairly high working-intown rates. The roadway focus is on Routes US2 and US3 that intersect in the vicinity of the town of Lancaster. These two US routes, along with Routes NH110, NH116, NH135, and Route 102 in Vermont link the five LMA towns and their many far flung villages.

Looking at the five towns displayed on Table 10.2, the town of Stark had the highest commute-out rate with 86.4%. The lowest commute out rate was established by Northumberland at 33.2%. Lancaster had the largest number of workers (547) commuting out. Lancaster and Northumberland were the favorite destinations, within the LMA, of the other towns in the area. Commuting-out numbers show 272 workers traveled to Lancaster and 267 to Northumberland. In an uneven exchange of commuters along Route US3, Northumberland furnished 160 workers to Lancaster and Lancaster provided 111 workers to Northumberland. Out-of-state commuters to Vermont numbered 165. Since three of the towns are seperated from the Green Mountain State by just the Connecticut River, the location of the bridges is a determining factor. Lunenberg VT was the destination (Route US2) for 83 of these commuters, 65 originating from the town of Lancaster, which also sent nine workers to distant Orono ME, seemingly too

far for a daily commute. Area-wide only an additional thirteen commuted to Maine, a straight but somewhat distant trek along Route US2.

Lancaster and Northumberland dominated the commuting-in data contained in Table 10.3, by swapping workers as noted above. Stark recorded eleven commuters, three coming from Jefferson and two from Maidstone VT. Jefferson also produced the second largest commute-in number in the LMA by sending 112 workers northwest to Lancaster along Route US2. Vermont furnished the largest number of out-of-staters into the LMA (275), crossing the Connecticut River at Lancaster, Northumberland, or North Stratford. Over 100 of those workers travelled east along US2 from Lunenburg VT. Maine supplied 23 workers to three of the towns in the LMA.
