Origin: Situated at the junction of the Pemigewasset and Winnipesaukee Rivers, where they meet to form the Merrimack River, this territory was originally known as Pemigewasset Village. Franklin was created from portions of Salisbury, Andover, Sanbornton, and Northfield, and named in honor of Benjamin Franklin. Franklin is the location of Daniel Webster's birthplace, which was in the portion of Salisbury taken to establish the town. Franklin was incorporated as a city in 1895. Franklin was known for a machine-made hosiery mill that used a process developed by the Shakers.

Population Trends: Population change for Franklin totaled

1,515 over 50 years, from 7,292 in 1970 to 8,807 in 2020. The largest decennial percent change was an eight percent increase from 1970 to 1980; annual population growth has been six percent or less since. The city's population increased by four percent from 2010 to 2020 The 2022 Census estimate for Franklin was 8,831 residents, which ranked 35th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

Population Density and Land Area, 2022 (US Census Bureau): 319.2 persons per square mile of land area. Franklin contains 27.7 square miles of land area and 1.5 square miles of inland water area.
