

Incorporated: 1791

Origin: This area was part of Cumberland or the "Society Land" which had been set aside by the Masonian Proprietors for their own estates. When first settled in 1753 by the Lynde family, it was known as Lyndeborough Addition. The Monadnock hills cut residents off from Lyndeborough's church and school, so in 1791 they petitioned for the right to form their own town. The name was chosen to indicate the town's location on a level, fertile ground between the hills. Greenfield is the location of the Crotched Mountain Foundation, providing community care for those with unique needs; the Crotched Mountain Ski Area; and Greenfield State Park, on Otter Lake.

Population Trends: Population change for Greenfield totaled 645 over 50 years, from 1,058 in 1970 to 1,703 in 2020. The largest decennial percent change was a 55 percent increase from 1980 to 1990. The town's population decreased by three percent from 2010 to 2020. The 2022 Census estimate for Greenfield was 1,724 residents, which ranked 154th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

Population Density and Land Area, 2022 (US Census Bureau): 65.1 persons per square mile of land area. Greenfield contains 26.5 square miles of land area and 0.6 square miles of inland water area.
