Incorporated: 1761

Origin: Granted in 1761, this town bears the name of General Phineas Lyman, an active commander in the Seven Years' War with France and Spain. General Lyman was compensated for his services by grants in Lyman, Grantham, and Lisbon, and 11 towns in what is now Vermont. The original grant recipients included ten others also named Lyman, which probably affected the selection of the town's name. Due to the remote location, settlers experienced difficulties in taking up the claim, and the grant was renewed in 1769. A section of Lyman was taken by legislature in 1854 to form the town of Monroe.

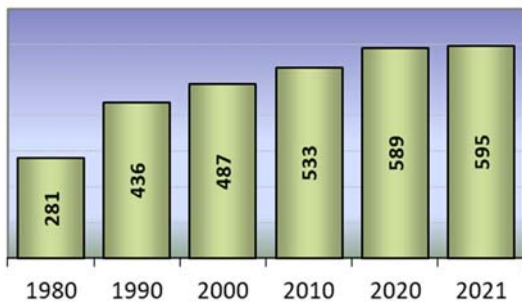
Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 202 residents in 1790

Population Trends: Population change for Lyman totaled 314 over 41 years, from 281 in 1980 to 595 in 2021. The largest decennial percent change was

a 55 percent increase between 1980 and 1990. The 2021 Census estimate for Lyman was 595 residents, which ranked 214th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.
