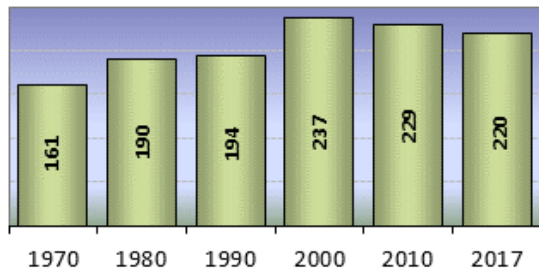
Incorporated: 1812

Origin: This territory was once a part of Monadnock Number 5 (Marlborough), one of the settlements reserved for soldiers of the French wars. In 1796, settlers in the southwest portion of Packersfield (Nelson), the northern portion of Marlborough, and the northwest portion of Dublin, who felt their homes were too far from the meetinghouses of their respective towns, petitioned for an incorporated town of their own. The 1796 petition failed, but petitioners were successful on their second try in 1812. The new town was named Roxbury after their old village, now part of Boston.

Villages and Place Names: Roxbury Center

Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 366 residents in 1820

Population Trends: Population change for Roxbury totaled 83 over 57 years, from 137 in 1960 to 220 in 2017. The largest decennial percent change was an increase of 22 percent between 1990 and 2000, a



numeric change of 43. The 2017 Census estimate for Roxbury was 220 residents, which ranked 232nd among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns, the third smallest community.

Population Density and Land Area, 2017 (US Census Bureau): 18.4 persons per square mile of land area. Roxbury contains 11.9 square miles of land area and 0.2 square miles of inland water area.
