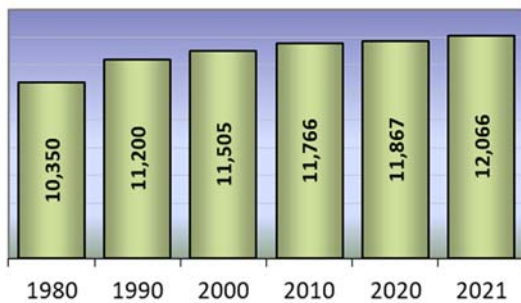

**Incorporated:** 1754

**Origin:** This territory was first settled about 1650 when it was part of Dover. It was made a separate parish in 1729, called Summersworth. In 1753, residents petitioned Governor Benning Wentworth for a separate township. The town was incorporated as Somersworth in 1754. In 1849, the town was divided nearly in half when the southern portion was incorporated as Rollinsford. Somersworth was incorporated as a city in 1893. Situated on the Salmon River, Somersworth has been home to many gristmills, sawmills, and cotton and woolen making establishments.

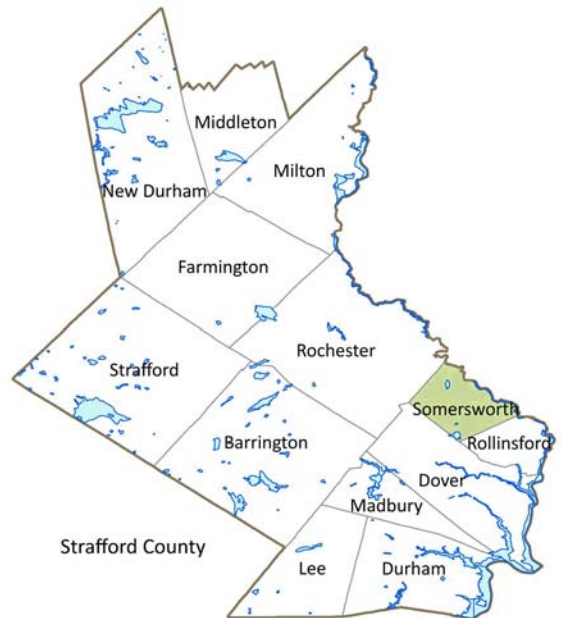

**Population Trends:**

Population change for Somersworth totaled 1,716 over 41 years, from 10,350 in 1980 to 12,066 in 2021. The largest decennial percent change was an eight percent increase between 1980 and 1990. The 2021 Census estimate for Somersworth was 12,066 residents, which ranked 25th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.



**Population Density and Land Area, 2021 (US Census Bureau):** 1,230.0 persons per square mile of land area, the eighth highest among the cities and towns. Somersworth contains 9.8 square miles of land area and 0.2 square miles of inland water area.
